The Sacraments – Our Life in Christ

Mysteries (Sacraments) of Initiation. Baptism, Chrismation, Holy Eucharist. We follow the command of the Lord to baptize in the name of the Father, Son, and the Holy Spirit (Matthew 28:19). Chrismation (Confirmation) and Holy Eucharist (First Holy Communion) are imparted at the same time immediately following baptism.

Mysteries (Sacraments) of Initiation of Infants – is scheduled at the Divine Liturgy on Saturdays or Sundays during the year except certain fast periods. Sponsors must be Catholics in good standing and supply a sponsor card attesting to that from their parish. While two Catholics in good standing is usual, one baptized non-Catholic can function as a Christian Witness with the Catholic sponsor. Both must be at least sixteen years of age. Details are available at the parish office.

Mysteries (Sacraments) of Initiation of Adults – follows a period of catechumenate. This is a period of spiritual formation. Please see the priest or deacon.

Mystery (Sacrament) of Crowning in Marriage – According to the Pastoral Policy and Guidelines for Marriage Preparation for the Catholic

Church in New Jersey, couples wishing to marry must inform the pastor one year before the date of the wedding and be free to marry in the Catholic Church. They will meet with the priest and deacon in four sessions—to begin the Pre-Nuptial Questionnaire, to take FOCCUS, a communication, values, and religious inventory approved for use in the Catholic dioceses/eparchies, to complete the Pre-Nuptial Questionnaire, and for a session on the Theology of the Mystery (Sacrament). They are also required to attend Pre-Cana Conference.

Mystery (Sacrament) of Repentance – The Mystery (Sacrament) of Repentance is regularly available each Saturday 11:30 AM to 12:00 Noon. In addition, confessions are heard during the Christmas Fast (Advent) and the Great Fast (Lent) at other scheduled times. Visiting confessors are also scheduled at special times during the Great Fast. Confessions are also heard on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday of Great and Holy Week. Parishioners who are seriously ill and those with life-endangering medical conditions as well as those who are to undergo surgery should avail themselves of confession at church or home where there is more privacy.

Anointing of the Sick – Parishioners who are seriously ill and those with life-threatening medical conditions as well as those who are to undergo surgery should avail themselves of the Sacrament of Penance and Anointing of the Sick. If surgery is scheduled, please consider confession and anointing at the church or at your home rather than the hospital since there is more privacy for confession and less chance for interruption. If you are unable to come to church or are at the hospital, family members should contact the rectory so Father can anoint at the hospital.

Holy Communion and Visitation of the Sick – Holy Communion is brought to our parishioners who are ill at the hospital or at home by the deacons on Sundays and at other time by arrangement. Please contact the deacons or the rectory office by Friday prior to the Sunday communion visitation.

Funeral Services – The Office of Christian Burial is offered in ways to accommodate the needs of the family. The Epiphany Ladies Guild as part of their charity offers a Mercy Meal for families at the Parish Center following the interment. Epiphany of our Lord cemetery are two portions of Fairfax Memorial Park. Parishioners who are interested in purchasing cemetery plots should see the deacon.

Prayers for our Parishioners. The particular Law of the Byzantine Ruthenian Metropolitan Church directs that “the pastor is to celebrate the Divine Liturgy for the people of the parish entrusted to him on Sundays and days of precept (holydays of obligation) (canon 294). This liturgy intention for parishioners is “For the Intention of Parishioners.” The faithful who attend the Divine Liturgy for the parishioners participate, according to their state, in praying for that intention. We can continue to pray for our parishioners by remembering several parishioners in our daily prayers each week. Christmas Fast. The forty-day Christmas Fast began November 15, the day after the feast of St. Philip which is November 14th. For this reason, it is also called Philip's Fast (Filipovka). The Fast concludes with the Paramony (Navečerije) of Christmas (Christmas Eve). Traditionally, this was a strict fast (no meat or dairy) Monday, Wednesday, and Friday with a lesser fast on Tuesdays and Thursdays. In the Byzantine Ruthenian Metropolitan Church in the United States, Fridays are a Day of Penance, and any other prescriptions of the Fast may be observed according to the conscience of the individual.

Christmas Fast Feasts and Fasts. While fasting during the Great Forty Day Fast before Pascha is a penitential prescription, the fasting practice during the Christmas Fast is one of preparation, for example, as is the Eucharistic Fast before receiving Holy Communion. In its liturgical structure, the Christmas Fast has several Aliturgical Days, that is, days when the Divine Liturgy is not celebrated. Usually these are on the commemoration days of the Old Testament prophets. By having a day when the Divine Liturgy is not celebrated, we are helped to experience with the Old Testament men and women the longing and waiting they had for the coming of the Christ, the Anointed Deliverer. The Christmas Fast is prepared by St. Philip's Day, because Philip's words are the summary of the Christmas Fast: “Philip found Nathanael and told him, ‘We have found the one about whom Moses wrote in the law, and also the prophets, Jesus, son of Joseph, from Nazareth.’” There are several saints commemorated during the Christmas Fast such as St. Matthew the Apostle and Evangelist whose gospel begins with the Genealogy of Christ (November 16), St. Andrew the First Called

Apostle, Apostle to Byzantium, whose words to his brother, Simon Peter, are a succinct summary of the Christmas Fast: “We have found the Messiah (which is translated Christ).” St. Nicholas, the patron-protector of the Byzantine Catholic Church and great saint of charity is commemorated on December 6th. Also, there are two important feasts of the Mother of God, her Entrance into the Temple on November 21st and the Conception of St. Ann or Immaculate Conception on December 8th.

Entrance of the Mother of God. The Entrance of the Mother of God is told in the *Protoevangelion of St. James*, a second century work not part of the Holy Scripture. It relates that the parents of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Ss. Joachim and Ann, brought their daughter to the Temple in Jerusalem when she reached age three, to remain there until the age of twelve, studying the Holy Scripture and being of service to the temple worship. The practice of the time was that girls from nobility entered this service of the Lord. What is recorded, though, is that in the case of the Blessed Virgin, she was led into the Holy Place and then entered the Holy of Holies where only the High Priest could go. IN this way, a prophecy was acted: this child would become the living Holy of Holies where the Most High God would dwell. This remote preparation for the birth of the Christ is the first announcement of the coming feast of Christmas. During the Matins or Morning Prayer of the feast day the canon of Christmas that begins, “Christ is born! Glorify Him!” is sung. Before World War II, starting on this feast day, in our churches in Europe young people began rehearsing Christmas Carols. In addition to this feast’s function as the announcement of the coming of Christmas, it is also the feast day of those named Mary and the feastday for consecrated women, nuns and sisters.
